As the communities in the area developed, your parish experienced some periods of growth and some periods of decline as the larger parishes in Stevens Point grew and developed.

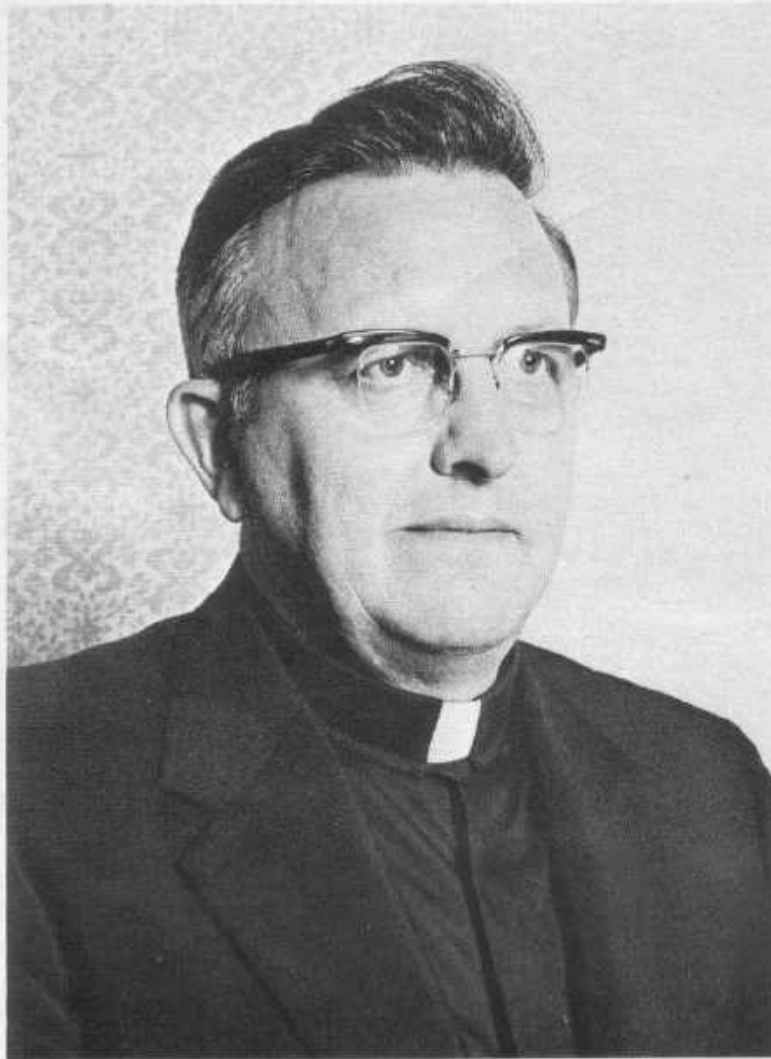

This booklet marking the 100th anniversary of St. Casimir's Parish is a vivid reminder of the Church's influence in this particular section of the vineyard of Christ. For many of you, especially those who have lived here since birth, this commemoration will take on special meaning as you recall fond memories of ancestors and by-gone days.

For all of us, it should be a reminder that, in our time and in our particular way, we too are called to be the people of God. By faithfully bearing witness to His gospel, we continue to form the church in our day.

We look to the past then that we may not forget our benefactors in the faith, for we are truly joined with them, with Christ and with one another in one bond of union. This is the real reason for our celebration. Finally, we look also to the future, hoping one day to find the true and final meaning of our life and death in the risen life with Christ.

Early History of the Church in Wisconsin

The pages of history are filled with the dates and deeds of men and women whose lives, for some reason, have merited remembrance. For most of us, history has come to mean merely the recounting of "important" events and the biographies of "important" people. Yet we know that these people are only a select few of the countless millions who have walked the earth before us.

When we delve into the stories of our own families, our own neighborhood and parish, we realize how greatly our lives have been influenced by our parents, teachers and pastors, for each of us continues to carry the memories of the past, even while busily involved in the affairs of the present moment. In a way, our knowledge of the past becomes a kind of "experience" of the past and we begin to sense our own participation in the long and continuing creation of God. In His eyes, our lives are no less dramatic or important than those who preceded us because we too are the "makers of history."

The first Catholic mission west of Lake Michigan was established in 1670 by the French Jesuit missionary Father Claude Allouez. His small mission-outpost was situated at modern-day De Pere, Wis., just a few miles from what is now Green Bay. For many years before the territory became part of the United States, it was included in the vast diocese of Montreal. The efforts of these early French missionaries have been carefully recorded in the "Jesuit Relations," a priceless chronicle of information in which we find their own personal accounts of work among the Indians.

While the history of the church in Wisconsin covers a period of 300 years, it is only in the last one hundred years or so that we have witnessed the rapid growth of so many established parishes, especially in our immediate Portage County area. Again, the story of the Church and the events of the time are so interrelated, that together they form one fascinating history.

Prior to 1836, the land on which St. Casimir's Parish is built was claimed by the Menomonee Indians. In that year a considerable tract of wilderness, 48 miles in length and three miles wide on either side of the Wisconsin River, was

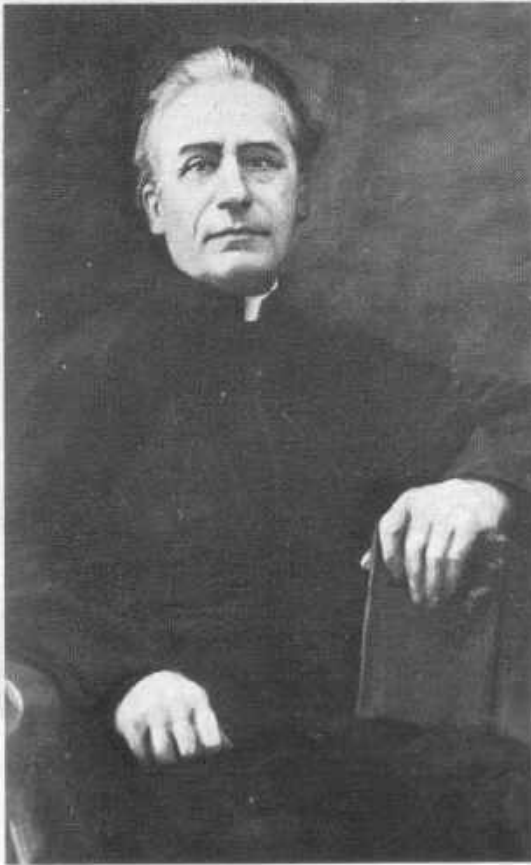
ceded to the U. S. Government by the Menomonees, an arrangement which came to be known as the Three Mile Survey or the "Indian Strip." It included approximately 185,000 acres, running from a point near Nekoosa to the mouth of the Eau Claire River in Schofield. Three years later, in 1839, a certain Joshua Hathaway was commissioned to make a survey of this newly acquired territory. Almost immediately, the lumbermen took advantage of this legality to gain access to the great stands of pine timber on the upper Wisconsin River. When viewing this stretch of the river today, with only an occasional fisherman or pleasure-boat in sight, it is difficult to imagine that in the 1850's and 1860's this was the scene of teeming activity, of logging operations and steamboats making their daily runs between Stevens Point and Mosinee, probably stopping at the trading post of John Baptiste DuBay south of Knowlton.

Following the agreement with the Indians in 1836 pioneer families from New England and the Ohio Valley began to settle in Portage County. They were followed in the 1850's and '60's by immigrants from England, Ireland and Scotland, from the Scandinavian countries, Germany and Poland. The first Polish immigrant to settle in Portage County was Michael Kozickowski, who arrived in the Stevens Point area in 1857 and later settled in Polonia. A great number of Polish immigrants followed, especially in the 1870's and by 1910 they had settled in the townships of Dewey, Hull, Sharon and Alban. Our own township of Hull was organized in 1858.

The founding families of St. Casimir's Parish were predominantly of Polish ancestry and many of their descendants continue to be members of the parish down to the present time. Because of the strong influence of the Polish language, culture and religious customs, the parish has continued to preserve a distinct form of Catholicism which is common to many of the parishes in this area.

The following biography of Father Joseph Dabrowski, founding pastor, and the history of St. Casimir's parish have been prepared from several sources, which are quoted here almost verbatim. While the information, in some instances, may be repetitious, it was decided to include the several accounts in order that none of the details would be omitted.

History of Saint Casimir Parish

First Pastor 1871-1875

The life of Fr. Dabrowski, reprinted below, is taken from "The History of Sacred Heart Parish, Polonia, Wis., Town of Sharon, Portage County. Published April 25, 1956. Compiled by: Mrs. Anton Bembenek.

"Father Joseph Dabrowski was born in Zol-tance, Poland, on January 27, 1842, the oldest of a family of four. His father died when he was a young boy of 12, thus much of the father's responsibility fell on him. Brilliance and industriousness marked his student days, first under private tutorship, then at Lublin secondary school where he showed special aptitude in mathematics and natural sciences.

Enrolled at the University of Warsaw in 1862 on a scholarship, he soon abandoned his books to join the ranks of the Polish insurgents in the revolt of January, 1863.

The defeat of the uprising forced Joseph to seek safety for a short time across the border, most probably in Saxony. Inevitably, he under-took odd jobs to earn money for a living and for resuming studies in mathematics and tech-nology to which he was strongly attracted.

But a more brilliant path than that of science lay in the destiny of the young refugee. Led by an inner call to the higher life, Joseph went to Galicia and entered the Lwow archdiocesan seminary in the fall of 1863. Three years later he left for Rome to continue his theological studies there. 'America attracted me from the very first,' wrote the 28 year old missionary. 'The church has a great future in this country.'

On previous agreement, in Rome, with Bishop Melcher to be accepted into the Diocese of Green Bay, he arrived at St. Francis Seminary in Milwaukee in January, 1870. Appointed pas-tor of a badly neglected parish at Poland Corners, Wisconsin, Father Dabrowski exhorted his parishioners by word and example to lead Godly and useful lives. The church at Poland Corners was surrounded by saloons influenced by bigotry, drunkenness and ill feeling. The new pastor was a man of convictions upon the subject of intemperance. He found it impos-sible to do God's work under such circumstances, determined to move the church to a new loca-tion. The greater portion of the congregation petitioned Bishop Melcher of Green Bay for permission to remove St. Joseph's church to a more suitable location. After receiving per-mission from the Bishop of Green Bay to go ahead, he dismantled the buildings and moved to the present location which he called Polonia.

A man of broad vision, Father Dabrowski understood that more than individual efforts were necessary to meet the needs of growing generations. His long nurtured plan finally came to realization in 1874 when, in answer to his urgent appeals, five Felician Sisters arrived from Poland to initiate their educational and charitable apostolate in America.

The pioneer sisters found a true friend and father in the thirty-two year old missionary.

He directed their work in the school, orphanage, and school for aspirants. He built and rebuilt the convent, school, and church, undaunted by fires that destroyed the buildings. He also opened a little printshop to publish school text-books written by the sisters and himself.

In 1882 the sisters transferred their mother-house to Detroit. Father Dabrowski accompanied them, becoming their chaplain, confessor, spiritual director and teacher at the Felician Seminary and advisor to the provincial administration. At the same time he undertook the building of the Polish Seminary there to provide priests for the Polish immigrants in America."

(Father Dabrowski's role in establishing St. Casimir's Parish in 1871 is described in the history which follows.)

"This congregation was established in 1871 by the Rev. Joseph Dabrowski, rector of Polonia Polish congregation in Portage County, Wisconsin. Hull, where St. Casimir's is situated is about four miles from Stevens Point and nine miles from Polonia. At this place Father Dabrowski built a little chapel, attending to the spiritual wants of these people until the fall of 1875, when the Rev. Josaphat Walun was appointed first resident pastor. He remained until October, 1878 moving afterwards to Stevens Point, where he died in November, 1881. Father Walun built the present church during his pastorate in 1877. (The church which appears in the early photograph on page 8.

His successor was the Rev. J. Czarnowski, who took charge of the pastorate in October, 1879 and remained until May, 1886. He completed the interior work and finishing of the church, among other things purchasing three altars for which he paid \$1,000.

After Father Czarnowski resigned the congregation of St. Casimir's was for seven months without a pastor. Then the Rev. Lucas Pescinski took charge on November 28, 1886, remaining until April 15, 1895. He built the present parochial school during the year at a cost of \$3,500. The enrollment now numbers about one hundred and eighty scholars, with the Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi in charge.

An interesting account of the dedication of

the school appeared in the Stevens Point Journal dated Oct. 6, 1888. (from a selection of clippings compiled by Alex Wallace).

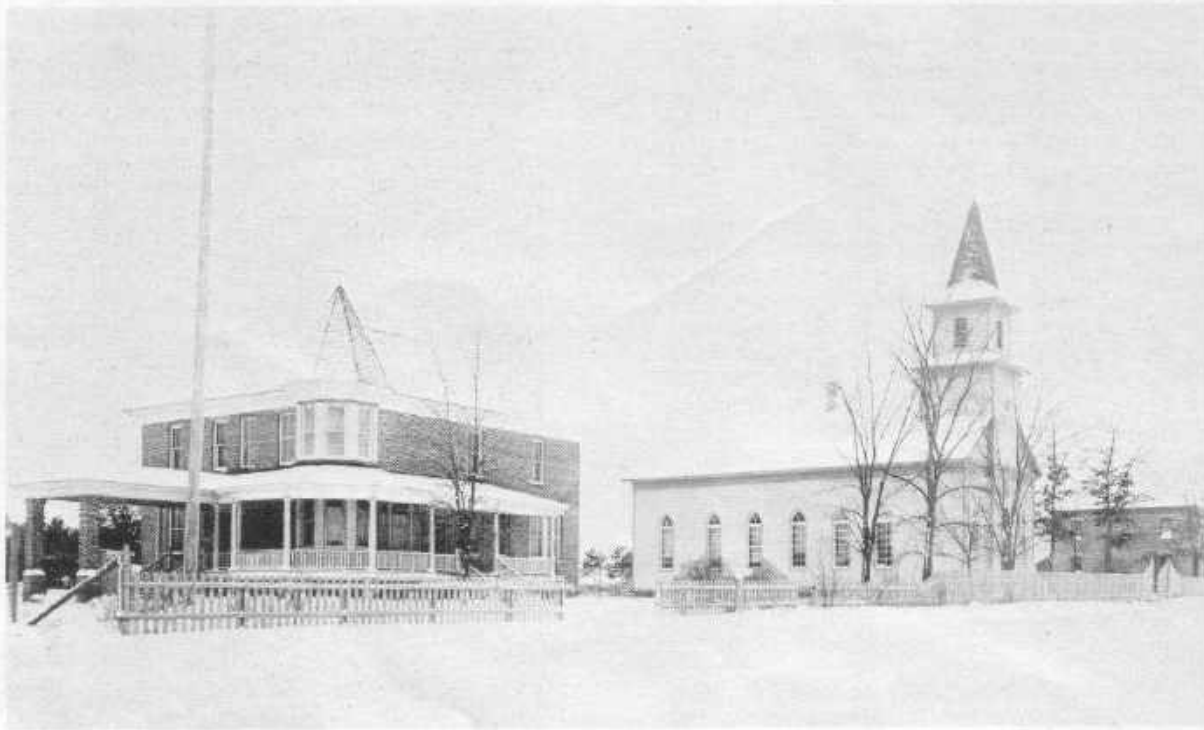
Rev. Pescinski informs us that the dedication of St. Casimir's school has been postponed until October 11. A procession of members of the church and others from the town of Hull will arrive in the city on the morning of the 10th and be received by Bishop Katzer at Father Alton's house on Clark St. The dedication will take place the day following at 10:30 A.M. preceded by solemn high mass. Dinner will be served to holders of tickets and all will be made welcome. The fair will commence on the 9th and continue three days.'

After Father Pescinski, the Rev. Ladislaus Grabowski assumed the duties from April 15, 1895 to February, 1896. He died at Hull on the 25th of that month and is buried at Polonia. He was succeeded by the Rev. N. Kolasinski in March 1896, who is the present incumbent.

Of Catholic societies in St. Casimir's congregation there were: the Holy Rosary Society, one hundred and fifty members, organized October, 1879; St. Casimir's Benevolent Society, forty members, organized 1888, and the Apostleship of Prayer, three hundred and fifty members, organized 1891. The congregation at the present time consists of eighty Polish, four German and two English families, making a total of over nine hundred souls in all.

The Rev. Nicodemus Kolasinski, the present pastor of St. Casimir's congregation at Hull, was born on the 14th of September, 1846 at Mielec, in Galicia, Austria. His classical studies were acquired at the Gymnasium of Tarnow and Cracow and those in philosophy and theology at the University of Vienna, Austria. He was ordained to the priesthood on the 18th of September, 1875 by His Eminence Luigi Morichini, Cardinal and Archbishop of Bologna, Italy. From 1875 to 1878 he was assistant pastor in Gross-Siegharts, of the diocese of St. Polten, Austria. From 1878 to 1884 he was rector of the parish at Schoenau, near Vienna; from 1884 to 1893, rector of Berea and Toledo, in the diocese of Cleveland, Ohio, and from 1893 to 1896 pastor of the congregations at Amherst Junction and Hull in the diocese of Green Bay."

Further details of the parish history are given in this article written by Fr. James E. Noonan, O.M.T. and printed in the La Crosse diocesan newspaper in 1955.

"St. Casimir's Church is located three miles north of Stevens Point, near highway 51. The parish was organized in 1871 by Father Joseph Dabrowski, pastor of Sacred Heart Church at Polonia. There was no Polish Catholic church at Stevens Point at that time. The present highway 51 was a Pony Express road. Indian trails were used for travel and people walked as many as 20 miles to get to church. So Father Dabrowski asked Bishop Henni of Milwaukee to allow him to build a church at this location. With permission granted, the erection of a little church was started in 1871, to be known as 'The Little Chapel.' Father Dabrowski attended this little chapel on horseback. The locality became known as Casimir.

Father Walun became the first residential pastor of St. Casimir's. Mary Ann Kieliszewski was the first person baptized by him, May 7,

1875. Father Walun was buried at St. Casimir's on Nov. 29, 1881. Father J. Czarnowski succeeded Father Walun, to be followed by Father Pescinski in 1886.

By this time the parish consisted of about 200 families. Baptisms ranged between 60 and 75 per year.

A meeting held in December, 1886, is the parish's oldest record. The minutes were written and signed by the then secretary of the parish, Stephen Tetzlaff.

School Built

A this meeting the parish decided to build a school. The following were elected as a building committee in November, 1887: Joseph Jerzak, Joseph Boyarski, Xavier Winkler, Jacob Ruta, John Kieliszewski, Matis Baker, Joseph Krajecki, Theophil Kutela, John Konopacki, John Sharkowski, Ignac Bachinski, and John Laszewski.

The foundation for the school was laid in 1886.

School Attendance

The school was finished in October, 1888, and Lucas Dziekan, a parishioner, was hired to teach for \$20 a month, beginning Nov. 5, 1888. Three sisters from St. Francis were hired to teach at St. Casimir, beginning in the fall of 1888. Two were to teach in the parochial school and one in the district school for \$200 a year each. In 1892 the school attendance was 165 children. Two hundred thirteen registered in 1893. Two bells were blessed in 1893. The smaller bell, weighing 503 pounds, was purchased for \$104.03, and the other weighing 1,000 pounds, was obtained for \$95 plus the old bell in exchange. In 1894 the congregation voted to change the name of the parish from Hull to St. Casimir, Portage County, Wis.

In February, 1895, Father Pescinski was succeeded by Father L. Grabowski. During

Minutes of Special Meeting

It was also decided at a meeting in 1888 that each family pay \$4 a year to cover the expense of running the parish and raising funds for building the school. Single persons could rent a seat in the church for \$1.50 a year. Widows and poor people could have their church dues reduced by applying to the building committee.

Eighty acres of woodland were bought by the parish with the understanding that each family with a team of horses or oxen was to bring one load of wood to the church each year or pay \$1 to the church treasury. Those who had no teams were to pay 50 cents or help one day in cutting wood. Widows and persons over 50 years old were excused. The pastor agreed to refund the money paid by the treasury for cutting his wood. These regulations were approved by the Most Rev. Bishop F. Katzer of Green Bay.

Father Grabowski's pastorate, agitation to form a new parish at Torun was at its height. Up to this time the territory of St. Casimir comprised the whole district known today as Knowlton and Torun.

In February, 1896, Father Nicodemus Kolasinski succeeded Father Grabowski. We have no records of what took place during his pastorate. In the minutes of a meeting held by the parish, it is stated that by order of His Excellency, Bishop Messmer, the records were destroyed.

In October, 1898, Father T. Malkowski became the successor of Father Kolasinski with Torun attached as a mission. Four months later he was succeeded by Father J. Kula.

In July, 1902, Father L. Kaspera succeeded Father Kula. In October, 1904, Father B. Polaczyk succeeded Father Kaspera.

The present rectory was built during his pastorate. The cost of the building was \$5,018. In September, 1909, Father Leo Jankowski succeeded Father Polaczyk and remained at St. Casimir until August, 1916. During this time the wooden church was destroyed by fire. A new brick structure, costing about \$5,000, was built and dedicated in November of the same year. (The first couples married in the present church were Stanley Winkler and Sally Gollon and also Sylvester Zywicki and Veronica

Bukowski in November, 1913 shortly after the dedication.)

Father Paul Sokol was the successor in August, 1916. Father Pruc followed in August, 1921. Five months later Father J. B. Gruna was appointed to replace Father W. Pruc. Father Gruna reopened the school, which had been closed for a few years.

In May, 1938, Father F. Disher followed Father Gruna. Father Disher left the parish in July, 1942, to serve as a chaplain in the army. Father S. A. Elbert followed. During his pastorate the school was closed because of insufficient numbers. Only 13 attended.

Father Elbert, already in his eighties, beautified the parish grounds by planting trees and erecting, with his own hands, a beautiful grotto.

He was succeeded June 29, 1948, by Father F. J. Brzostowicz.

During his pastorate several improvements were made to parish buildings including the addition of a new furnace room, tuck-pointing and new roof for the church.

Father "Frank" retired in August, 1969 and lived in Whiting, Wis. until his death four months later on Dec. 15, 1969. Funeral services were conducted at St. Casimir's on Dec. 17.

Father Arthur Redmond, present pastor, succeeded Father Brzostowicz on Aug. 6, 1969.

Rev. Casimir Szatkowski, one of twelve children of the late Anton and Mrs. Catherine Szatkowski, is a native son of St. Casimir's parish. During his early school years he moved with his family to Chicago where he attended Quigley Preparatory Seminary and then St. Mary of the Lake major seminary in Mundelein, Illinois. He was ordained in 1950 for the Archdiocese of Chicago and presently serves as pastor of St. John Berchman parish in that city.



FRANCIS DANCZYK

Francis Danczyk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Danczyk, is a graduate of Pacelli High School and Holy Cross Seminary in La Crosse, where he received his B. A. Degree in 1963. After attending Mt. Saint Mary Seminary in Cincinnati, Ohio, for one year, he has done outstanding work as a papal volunteer in Mexico. His special missionary endeavor has been the establishment of some twenty cooperatives and credit unions among the very poor.

The interior of the church remains much the same as when it was built in 1913. In keeping with the recent liturgical reform, plans are now being made to enlarge and simplify the sanctuary, to relocate the sacristy near the front entrance, to redecorate completely. Hopefully, this project will be finished by the end of this Centennial year.



Catechetical Center

The old school, completed in 1888, takes on new life and a new look. Closed in 1948 for lack of students, the building lay idle for many years. It has remained in remarkable condition, however, because of its original sturdy construction. In 1970 parishioners decided to remodel the entire structure to serve as a catechetical center and also to provide pleasant surroundings for parish meetings and socials. Temporary walls in the convent area were removed and the interior room arrangement is the same as when originally built. A new heating system has been installed to replace the old space heaters. A new plumbing system includes toilet facilities in the basement. Six classrooms on the first and second floors feature suspended ceilings with recessed lighting fixtures, paneled walls and carpeted floors. A large paneled room in the basement

serves as classroom, meeting room, etc. A small kitchen will include facilities for social groups. An addition on the south side includes enclosed stairways to the first floor and basement, a cloak-room and storage space. A fire escape has been installed on the west side. Although much of the above work was done by contractors, some of the parishioners have volunteered much time and effort in making old St. Casimir's school a valuable asset to the parish once more.

Lay teachers from the parish have also volunteered their talents in conducting a program of religious education on Saturday mornings for 130 students. Last year's staff included Bonnie Kawleski, Isadora (Mrs. Henry) Carroll, Lynda Kolodziej, Doris (Mrs. Francis) Napiewocki, Elaine King, Rose (Mrs. Roger) Pionek, Warren Lensmire and Fr. Redmond.

History of the Lay Advisory Board

Each year in February, the Rosary Society held its one and only meeting of the year. The only business conducted was the reading of the treasurer's bank balance and the adding of new members by assignment to "a mystery." The meeting held in 1968 became a bit unusual inasmuch as questions were raised concerning how the money was being used, what else does the society do, who provides for the catechetical program, and what were the parish goals.

Answers to these questions were not easy to provide. It was therefore suggested that an all parish meeting be held, and that the Rosary Society should host this meeting at a Sunday breakfast and talk about the needs of the parish. It would seem desirable, that if at this time a group of people would be elected or volunteer to serve as a lay advisory board.

The breakfast, with the approval of the pastor, was held on Sunday, February 26, 1968. After the breakfast, Mrs. Grace Lensmire explained the purpose of the gathering, and outlined some of the obvious reasons for forming a Lay Advisory Board. Nine people volunteered their services, and with the pastor, immediately set forth to work on some of the most urgent projects.

The first meeting of the Board was held on Wednesday, February 29, 1968 with Grace Lensmire presiding as temporary chairman. The following people were present, and officers were elected. Rev. F. J. Brzostowicz, Norbert Strojny, President, Ted Kubley, Vice-President, Grace M. Lensmire, Secretary, Angeline Zaleski, Len Losinski, Marvin Przekurat, Ed Poznaniak, Stan Mijal, and Tony Danczyk.

The second meeting of the Board was held on March 13 and the following list of priorities were developed:

- Improvement of heating system to include basement area
- Total assessment of building needs
- Church doors and vestibule
- Church interior decoration
- Roof
- Extermination of bats
- Sewage disposal system
- Toilet facilities
- Parking lot
- Liability insurance
- Parish census

It has since been felt that broader representation would be desirable. The parish was divided into five areas (by geographic distribution.) Several members from each area were nominated and a parish election selected one member from each area, enlarging the Board to 14 members. New members include Area 1, Barney Walkush, replaced by Louie Gard; Area 2, Erv Ligman; Area 3, Frank Barber; Area 4, Ray Kawleski; Area 5, Leonard King. Ted Kubley is now serving as temporary president.

Presently the Board is being enlarged to 15, three from each area, and an orderly system is being developed to retire one-third of the membership annually. The Board has met monthly since its inception. It has published minutes and distributed them to all parishioners and the Chancery Office. All parishioners are encouraged to attend meetings. Major issues are decided at specially called meetings of all envelope holders.

Since February, 1968, the following accomplishments have been cited:

- Catechetical program, utilizing lay teachers
- Installation of pastor following retirement of Fr. Brzostowicz
- Complete renovation of Rectory to include sewage system
- Complete renovation of previous school building converting it to a CCD center or Parish Community Center
- Employment of custodian
- Initiation of envelope system for church support and Christian sharing
- Membership in the Stevens Point Area Religious Council
- Revitalization of the Rosary Society
- Parish census
- Committees established to deal with various problems
- Plans about to be initiated for the complete interior and some exterior renovation and decoration to the church
- Volunteer groups organized to improve church grounds and buildings.

St. Casimir Rosary Society

St. Casimir's Rosary Society is one of the oldest organizations in the long history of the parish, having been started in 1879. In recent years it has taken a more active role in the affairs of the parish. Meetings are held once a month from September through May on the last Monday of the month. Members are divided into 8 Roses or groups with a total of 120 members. Present officers are the following: President, Theresa (Mrs. Norbert) Strojny; Vice-President, Rose (Mrs. Roger) Pionek; Secretary, Doris (Mrs. Francis) Napiwocki; Treasurer, Loraine (Mrs. Anthony) Danczyk. Sunshine Committee Chairman is Angie (Mrs. Thomas) Zalewski. The society is affiliated with the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women. Grace (Mrs. Warren) Lensemire serves as Deanery

representative to the Diocesan Council.

Some of the projects sponsored by the society are Christian sharing, i.e. a \$10 a month donation to some charitable cause, the distribution of food baskets to members of the Parish at Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter, also supplying necessary equipment for the kitchen and purchasing supplies and furnishings for the Catechetical Center.

Ladies also make Baptismal garments for the newly baptized. One of the members has recently made new cassocks and surplices for the servers and special "Sacrament" stoles for all members of this year's Confirmation class.

From now on the organization will be known as "St. Casimir's Christian Women's Society."

Life In The Parish Through The Years

The random selection of pictures on the following pages is included as a reminder that the life of the parish is really the total life of its people. Good family-life will always be the foundation of a vital parish. We present a few pictures which parishioners have shared with us, but in a way they represent all of us because we too cherish the memories of family-life and our association with the Church.

An interesting account of this old cabin, located on the Range Line (County "X") is given by Alois Skupniewicz, now 87 years old. He states that the cabin was built by John, Mike and Peter Gonsiorowski, probably in the latter part of the last century. Joseph Napi-

wocki moved it from Andrew Kurzynski's place (presently Barney Kurzynski's property) to its present location near the little Eau Claire River. Residents of the cabin through the years included Andrew Kurzynski, Joseph, Alex and John Napiwocki (three generations). Mr. and Mrs. Paul Obremski (former members of St. Casimir's now living in Stevens Point) and their family lived there for a time. It was the birthplace of their children Mamie, John, Helen and Sophie. Alois Skupniewicz purchased the building in 1927 and rented it to various families. It has recently been acquired by the Portage County Park Commission and will be taken to Jordan Park near the Plover River, a reminder of by-gone days in the county.

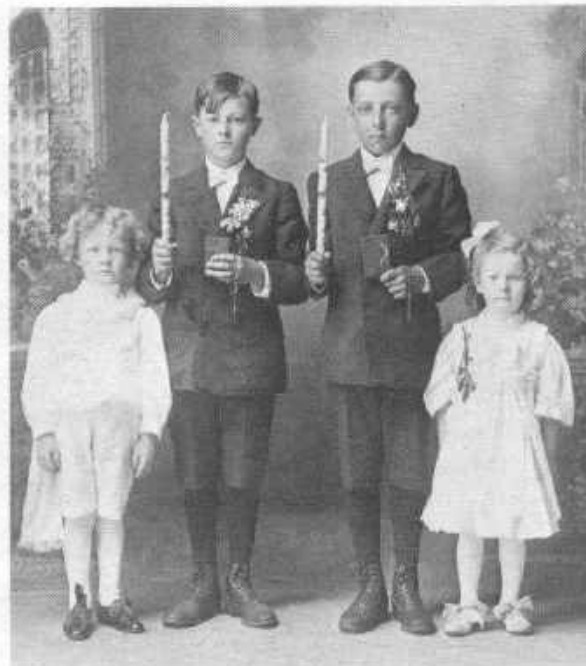

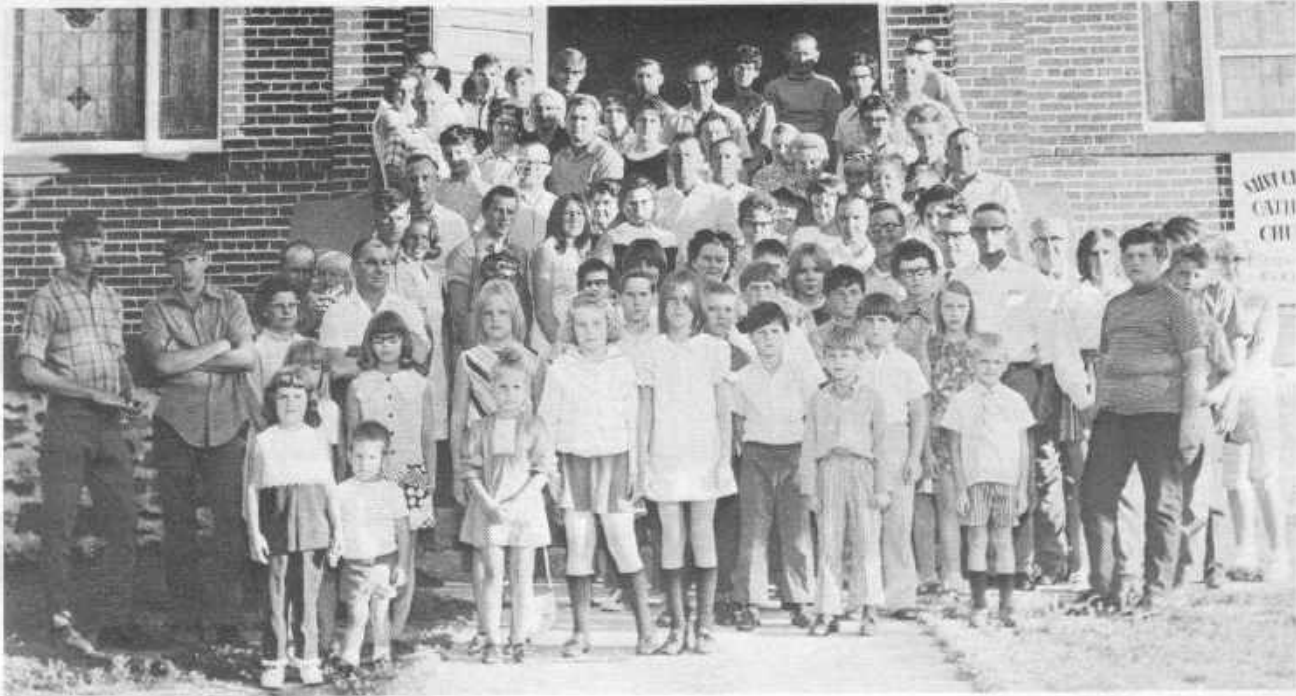

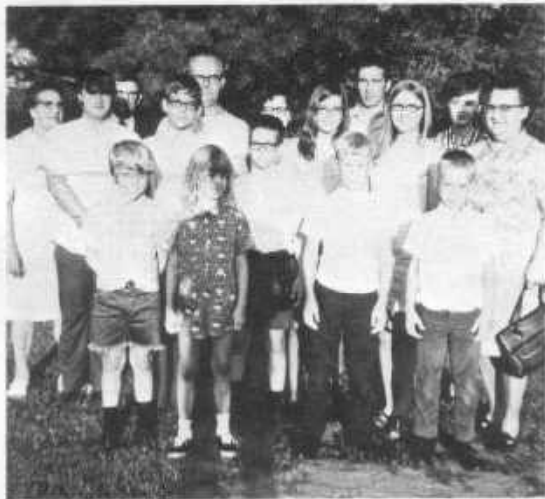
