UNION CEMETERY HISTORY

IN THE YEAR 1853 A PLAT OF LAND (ABOUT 1 AC.) WAS PURCHASED BY THE STEVENS POINT CEMETERY ASSOCIATION FROM MOSES STRONG P. 364 & 365 PLAT 367). IN 1854 ANOTHER PLAT OF LAND WAS PURCHASED FROM WILLIAM GRIFFIN FOR SAME PURPOSE. IT WAS SUB DIVIDED INTO LOTS AND BLOCKS AND NAMED UNION CEMETERY. IN 1927 THE COUNTY COURT AUTHORIZED THE CEMETERY ASSOCIATION TO SELL AND CONVEY TO THE CITY OF STEVENS POINT AN EASEMENT AND RIGHT OF WAY TO INSTALL AND MAINTAIN IN AND ACROSS SAID CEMETERY A STORM SEWER 48" DIAMETER (SEE VOL: 144 P.632) DURING APRIL 1929 A FENCE AROUND CEMETERY WAS INSTALLED. THE CITY PAID FOR THE FENCE INCLUDING TWO LOTS AND MOVED GRAVES TO THE FOREST CEMETERY (SEE VOL: 144 P. 15½).

Know all men by these presents, that whereas at a meeting held on the fourth day of December, AD, Eighteen hundred and fifty two at the school house in the town of Stevens Point, County of Portage, and State of Wisconsin in for the purpose of forming and organizing a cemetery association under the statutes in such case made and provided. How therefore we being the chairman and Secretary of said meeting do certify as follows:

1. Said meeting was called at the aforesaid time and place, for the purpose aforesaid by a majority of the associates here in after stated, and who were then and there assembled pursuant to a previous notice.
2. Mr. A. G. Ellis was chosen chairman and A. Rood was chosen Secretary of said meeting by a majority of the persons then and there present.
3. The names of the associates, who attended said meeting, are as follows: N. F. Bliss, A. Rood, A. Brawley, A. Judd, J. L. Young, V. Maybee, J. L. Pickard, W. H. Gilchrist, Wm. Griffin, E. Johnson, J. B. Robb, M. A. Finch, A. G. Ellis, J. G. Spaulding, R. Gardiner, J. L. Brown, J. W. Gardiner, Lewis Johnson.
4. The Stevens Point Cemetery Society was the corporate name of the association determined upon by the majority of the persons.
5. The number of trustees sined upon to manage the affairs of the society were six, who were chosen at said meeting and whose names are as follows: A. Rood, V. Maybee, J. L. Young, N. F. Bliss, A. G. Ellis, A. Judd.
6. The said trustees were by the said chairman and secretary classified by lot as follows: First Class A. Rood 2nd N. F. Bliss to hold their offices for one year. Second class V. Maybee and A. Judd to hold their offices for two years. Third class J. L. Young and A. G. Ellis to hold their offices for three years.
7. The first Monday in December was also sined upon by said meeting as the day for the annual Election of Trustees.

The Union Cemetery Association; Common City Cemetery held their annual meeting 16 July 1881. Officers, President H. B. Martin; Secretary J. R. Kingsbury; Treasurer L. D. Conery, who held the position for eleven years, many improvements were made and excellent conditions kept do to him.

When he took hold, everything about the cemetery was run-down and the Association in debt. The last eleven years interment averaged about eleven each year, last year fifteen have been interred, and all but eight or ten lots now sold.

More room is needed so bought 40 acres of Sheriff Rousseau, on the hill, on the North side of Main, this side of the Plover River, the 40 lies on the top of the hill, and propose in summer to fence. They will run a picket fence along the road, three sides enclosed with a neat painted board fence. Mr. Conery is in charge.

A large portion of Episcopal also sold and talk of enlarging also buying a tract of 40 acres adjoining present grounds.

UNION CEMETERY STORY

About two years ago Miss Marian Earll, now Mrs. Herbert Parmeter, called up a number of worthy citizens for the purpose of raising sufficient amount of cash to purchase a pump to set in what is known as the City Grave Yard, on Water Street.

The necessary amount was collected and a pump purchased to put in, where it remained doing justice to the many plants and flowers that decorated the graves of the dearly departed, up to last fall or in spring, some rascal entered the Yard and unscrewed the pump and carried it away. The water that now rises from the pump should be turned to vinegar and gall by the Divine Power and the thief be compelled to drink it during the balance of his existence on this world of vice.

A Cemetery now Plover Hills, subdivision on the East side, a small part owned by the city and and rest by the now defunct Association, which was also owned by the Union Cemetery, south of Soo Railroad.

Called Oakwood or Oak Wood, in 1920 plans to turn Plover Hills into a residential area. The Journal of 2 October 1923, the Common Council agreed to sell it's part to A. H. Sikes, who owned land around the area. He agreed to move the eight bodies to the Forest Cemetery. The Cemetery Association sold its part to Sikes in 1925, and it is presumed the people buried there were also moved to Forest. Oakwood didn't exist until 1881.

Maybe Veterans of 1880's and 90's who were in Potters Field were also moved.

From the Archives of Portage County Library 1989

The Post 156 will mark the graves of Soldiers with a stone, 12 x 16 above ground, to be placed at the foot of the grave, so that on Decoration Day, flags can be placed on the Soldiers graves.

On Saturday the 22nd of August 1891 a meeting of several citizens of Portage County, Wisconsin was held at the Union Cemetery in City of Stevens Point and was called to order by John Mc Greer.

Upon motion made and seconded R. Van Houton was chosen Chairman and John Mc Greer was chosen secretary.

Motion made and carried that meeting proceed to form a cemetery association of Portage County that the number of trustees shall be three and that the annual meeting of such association shall be held at the Court House in the City of Stevens Point on the first Monday in May at the hour of 2 o'clock P. M. the following named persons were chosen trustees:

J. L. Smith	for the term of one year
Robert Main	two years
John Mc Greer	three years

Motion made and carried that the annual election of trustees shall be held on the first Monday in May.

This association is formed for the purpose of taking, holding and occupying the Union Cemetery of Stevens Point and preserving and caring for the same. We the undersigned do hereby certify the foregoing is true and correct in each and every respect.

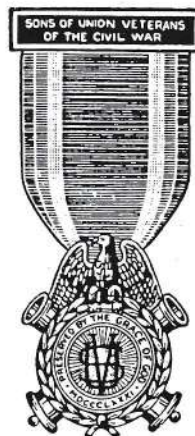

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Biographical History of the Union Cemetery on Water Street

Compiled from my research information, the Guyants Cemetery records of 1973, maps and block and lot records on file in the City Hall, obituaries taken from the local newspapers, that are on file in the Portage County Library and some Court House records. 1989

ETHEL BELLE ABBOTT, the daughter of T. E. and C. K. Abbott, died 10 September 1882, birth date 15 March 1882. Eugene Abbott and Carrie A. Beggs, married 30 January 1881, these may be her parents. Eugene was born in Scotland. The data from the stone is to illegible to be accurate. Harrison Sloggy the original owner of lot 1 in block 12.

ANDREW J. ALDRICH, born 1829, died 12 February 1865 at the age of thirty six, too early for further data.

HARRIET E. WILMOT ALDRICH, was born in Pennsylvania, 1839, married at the age of sixteen, Andrew passed way eleven years later, leaving her with three children. She died 3 January 1896 in Amherst, Wisconsin at the age of fifty seven. Her father, David Wilmot and brother Benjamin survive also. The body was brought by train to Stevens Point and buried beside her husband in the Union Cemetery. Olive Aldrich, became Mrs. A. F. Van Epp on 19 September 1876, was with her mother when she died. Son, Frank L. Aldrich, married Theresa Meyer, daughter of Jennie, in November 1900, they later moved to Boseman, Montana. A. J. or Jack Aldrich lived in Helena, Montana. #57 Gazette 8 January 1896 Col: 2 p 4

*ARTHUR ALFT, was born 15 December 1895 at Split Rock, Wisconsin, the son of the late Michael Alft. When a child the family moved to Kellner, Wood County, Wisconsin and farmed. He worked as a farmer and logger, retiring in 1964. Moved to Nelsonville, Wisconsin in 1970, lived on College Avenue in the City from 1975. He died Sunday 6 August 1979, Rev. Herbert H. Thompson conducted the funeral from Boston Funeral Home and the St. Paul's United Methodist Church. Burial in the Union Cemetery. Survivors, a sister, Mrs. Laura Reitmeir, of San Diego, California, and nieces and nephews. Four brothers and four sisters preceded.

Unknown what relation to Arthur was Oscar "Bud" Alft of Wisconsin Rapids. He was born 14 September 1921 the son of Edward and Mable Alft, he passed away 22 February 1994. He was married to Virginia Arnold, 14 June 1947 at Altdorf. Survivors are four sons and six daughters. He is buried in Restlawn Memorial Park.

GRUMAN AMSBRY, died 2 February 1871, buried in Block 16 lot 2. No other data. First name from Surveyors book.

CHARLES D. ANDRESS, the only child of F. L. and G. A. Andress, (Guyants) died of Cholera Infantum, born 12 January 1877, passed way on 13 August 1877 at the age of eight months and one day. Burial on the Roswell Blanchard lot 6 in block 8 in the Union Cemetery.

FLAVILLA P. ANDRESS, the wife of Charles L. Andress, born 9 April 1821, had reached the age of fifty four years, four months and three days, passing away on 12 August 1878. She had been ill for most of a year, spending the last six months helpless. Charles was away in Ashland, Wisconsin so her only son and his wife took care of her. She is buried in Block 13 lot 10 of the Union Cemetery, Charles was the original owner.

Unknown if HARVEY G. ANDRESS, who was a traveling man and made many trips to Stevens Point, Wisconsin, and passed away in the Winnebago County hospital, at the age of forty seven years, was related to Charles. Harvey left a son Ray, his aged parents of Vesper, Wisconsin, a brother and sister in Marshfield, Wisconsin and Oshkosh, Wisconsin. The funeral was in Marshfield.

DAVID M. ANDREWS, was the son of Jerimiah and Genevieve La Mere Andrews, born 1876/1881, he died in Rhinelander, Wisconsin, 7 April 1922. The body was brought to the residence of his sister, for burial in the Union Cemetery, beside his parents. He married Mrs. Celina Hubbard in August 1903, she and her two children survive, they are Archie and Mrs. Ed Carroll. His sisters, Mrs. Sol Godin, Mrs. Clara Shepreax, Mrs. Adolph Shaurette, Mrs. Robert Juchen and Mrs. Hugo Horst, brothers Frank and Lewis also survive.

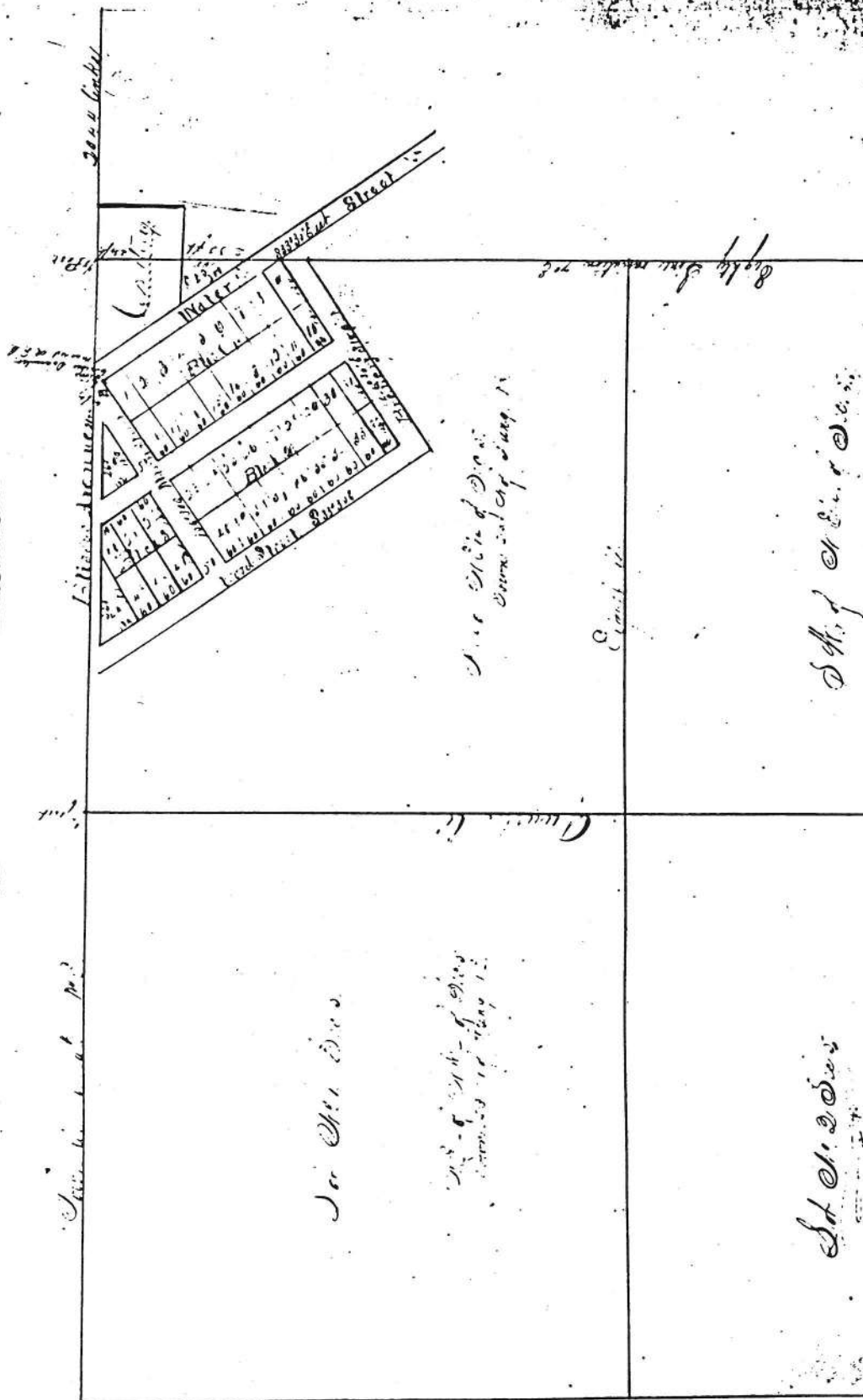

JOHN GARDINER, an early day lumberman and stock raiser, was born in Mariatown, near Prescott, Canada, on 29 December 1837. Came to Stevens Point in 1852. His father, died in 1855 shortly after coming to the City. In 1860 he started for Oregon, but stopped in Denver, Colorado and found work on a ranch. He enlisted there September 10, 1861, in Co. He was Actor, Musician, Electrician, Member of Church of Christ, Mason, Knights of Pythias, Eastern Star and Knights of Khorrasen. Traveled with the theatrical company for forty years. He died at the age of ninety three in Mississippi on 21 December 1981.

CLARA ALICE VIVIAN CROCKER HALL, born 27 June 1866 at Eau Pleine, Wisconsin, the daughter of Sylvester and Christina Sinclair Crocker. They were married 18 January 1888. She died at Mokena, Illinois on 8 August 1951 at the age of eighty five years. She had taught school before marriage, her father performed the ceremony for her marriage. She also performed in the company.

VIRGINIA INEZ MAY HALL, infant daughter of Don C. and Clara Crocker Hall, born 26 April 1910, died 15 September 1910.

MERLE MAY MOGLE HALL, and Don C. Hall were married 5 October 1908 at Ottawa, Ohio. The daughter of Daniel Eseriel and Virginia Frances Chilton Mogle. Born at Indianapolis, Indiana on 3 May 1883. Died in Mississippi, 19 November 1962, at the age of seventy nine.

WALTER RICHARD HALL, the son of Don C. and Clara Crocker Hall, was born 23 September 1890, was a Musician, Actor and Artist, he died at the age of eighty three years, at Milwaukee, Wisconsin on 1 June 1974. His wife was Edna Hagen, born 11 April 1892, died 29 January 1950 at the age of fifty seven years. Their son Walter, Jr., was born 15 January 1926, remained unmarried.

The father, Henry had a Shoe Repair shop and an Uncle to Anna Bronson, whose husband Thomas was also a Shoemaker. These people are all related

HARLOW, NO NAME, a son of Louis B. and Maude Harlow, was born 8 August 1882 and died the 9th. Buried in the Union Cemetery in lot 1 of block 9. (Lorin B. and Maude L. Vol: B p 12.

CHARLES H. HANEY, the youngest son of Edward L. Haney, was born at Clayford, Dubuque County, Iowa, on the 30th of April 1884. He died on 25th of November 1895; the family had just moved back from Crandall, Texas. Each member had been ill with Malaria fever. His brother George Haney, had died six weeks ago in Texas or about the 13th of October 1895. Other members of the Haney family, John, Mrs. Axtel, Edith, born about 1867, Agnes, and Susan. His mother was a sister to Mrs. James Shumway.

An Addie Harris had a millinery Shop which she opened in October 1867. Burial for Adgie

is in lot 5 of block 12--Melinds Harris in lot 19 of block 3 in the Union Cemetery. In the 1850 census an Adeline Harris was living with Thomas and Mary Mc Dill.

CHARLES HARTLE, lived in the City since a boy, he later became blind, and attended schools for the blind in Janesville, Wisconsin and made brooms. After attending an advent meeting, he proceeded to the river bridge and committed suicide by jumping in the river. This occurred on a Friday night the 16th of August 1878 at 11:p.m. Thomas and Wilhelmina Hartle were his parents, the father upon hearing about his son, went back to bed, showed no feelings on the death. Charles had a half brother who was age fourteen. The body was placed in a coffin and taken to the home on Main Street, the father being drunk created a disturbance, so Mayor Mc Lean had the body taken to the Station House, from there to the City Cemetery. No regular funeral, a few remarks were made by Judge Stumpf. The City Cemetery became the Union Cemetery, and because there are some unknowns in lot 1A in block 10, this could be the resting place for Charley.

HENRY W. HILL, Jr., the story about Henry is that he was engaged in unlawful practice of setting guns. Which may account for his being shot in the woods, 28 December 1874. He was the son of Henry and Mariah Hill, born in Cattaraugus County, New York on 4 March 1850. Burial in the Union Cemetery in lot 10 of block 19. His age father and a sister Jane Augusta survive. Jane wife of Henry A. Kyes.

HIRAM IRWIN HOAG, born 4 May 1858, probably in Almond, Wisconsin when the family was living there, the son of Neuman and Phoebe Jane Mc Cleary Hoag. He died 14 February 1873 at the age of fourteen years, nine months and ten days.

James had remarried to Mrs. Christina Henning, she and her children, William Henning, Mrs. Robert Hande, Mrs. Ralph Coniff also survive. Services from ST. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran church, Rev. R. H. Hudtolff officiated, grave side services conducted by Mr. Stumpf of the Odd Fellows. Burial in lot 15 of block 1. Body later moved to the Forest cemetery with Mrs. Lindore's. The child's body remained. Jessie H. Marshall was a member of the First Presbyterian Church

(Mattie an invalid and had been for about seven years, dying at age forty one, left seven children, Was Mattie and Maggie the same?)

WILLIAM F. MANN, the son of James and Caroline H. Mann, was born 26 April 1850 in Wisconsin, died 5 July 1851 at the age of one year, two months and nine days. In the Library archives a ROBERT MANN, is buried in the Union Cemetery, no other data. William is buried in lot 10 of block 4. Azeo Martin the owner of the lot.

JESSE J. MARTIN, born 15 July 1850, died at the age of one year, one month and fourteen days, on 20 August 1851.

JIMMIE MARTIN, no data, they are the children of Hiram and Mary E. Martin. Burial in lot 1 of block 8 in the Union Cemetery.

LEWIE MARTIN, born 13 November 1867 died 30 May 1870, at the age of two years, six months and seventeen days.

Hiram B. Martin was Fire Chief in the city, his wife Mary E., died on the 2nd of May 1884 after an operation for strangulated hernia, she had reached the age of sixty three years. Had lived in the vicinity for thirty five years. Her husband and six children survived her. The funeral was from the Baptist church, and burial in lot 1 of block 8. After her death, Hiram lived at the Hotel, he is buried in the Forest Cemetery. She may have been moved at that time.

JAMES M. MASTERSON, having been born about 1811 and dying at the age of forty two years on 20 June 1853, may be one of those, whose body was evacuated to make way for buildings. It is unknown if he had a wife.

MARY MASTERSON, was born 28 August 1852 and died 28 February 1853, she may or may not be a daughter of James M. Masterson, he owned lot 16 in block 6, it was no doubt purchased for her burial. He followed soon after.

ASA E. MATHEWSON, had been a resident of Wisconsin for thirty three years, thirty two of them in Portage County. He was in the Meat Business with George Stenger and William Walton. A Civil War Veteran,

Co G 18th Regiment, from 5 November 1861 to 13 September 1862. He was born in Rhode Island on 20 October 1822, died 12 September 1884, had reached the age of sixty one years, ten months and twenty two days. His first wife was Mary, last name unknown, after she died he married Maria Adams, she died 15 November 1893. His funeral service was read by Rev. H. Frank, the Grand Army Post of which he was a member, escorted the body to the Union Cemetery.

MARY MATHEWSON, born 28 August 1826 in Rhode Island, died at the age of forty seven years, seven months and eleven days, on 1 August 1874. There was a daughter, Anna, born about 1846. Burial in lot 4 of block 18.

CORNELIA A. MAYBEE, the small daughter of Orrin and Martha Maybee, born 19 February 1850 and died 2 June 1850 at the age of three months and thirteen days. (This may not be the correct data, unknown if she same as Cereba age one year in the 1850 census) When construction was conducted in the Union Cemetery, the body was moved two feet north in lot 10 of block 7. Orrin Maybee owned the lot.

From #53 Gazette 24 December 1890 Col: 1 p 1, excerpts from the obituary, Orrin Maybee, his death occurred on Friday last, one of the first white settlers, third man to take up home where Stevens Point now stands. One other man in 1838. His first home was at Conant Rapids, for a couple of years, from 1840 to 1861, lived in the city. Ran a Hotel with James Young, then a general supply ware house on Clark Street. One of the first Rapids Pilots. His home South of Amherst was sold a few weeks ago. Orrin was born Genessee County, New York, 28 May 1820, he was in his 71st year. Before coming west, lived with his parents in Canada, during the Canadian Rebellion. Poor Health the last couple of years, so he went to live with his daughter, Mrs. Samuel Marks at Antigo, Wisconsin. Edward lived at Amherst and Frank in Chicago. Brothers, Maurice of Portage, two in California. Sisters, Mrs. Gray of West Bend, Pa., Mrs. Fester of California. Funeral was on Monday with Rev. Jacob Patch officiating, burial beside his wife and daughter in the cemetery known as "Lower Town," Delores J. Brenner is researching this family.

HUGH Mc GREER, the progenitor of the family that is buried in the Union Cemetery in lots 1,2,3, of block 9. He was born in County Antrim, Ireland. Came into Portage County from Canada in 1840. He built a sawmill in Jordan, a few miles north of Stevens Point, Wisconsin. He was the first man in the county to apply for citizenship in 1845. He raised a family of nine children, but most of them died very young and buried with him. He passed away 5 April 1873. Born year of 1801

HANNAH Mc GREER, the wife of Hugh, came with her husband from Canada, to make their home in Portage County. She died from a stroke, from which she never fully recovered, was effected mentally and physically, on June 16, 1888, she was age seventy two. John H., Lottie and Hannah were the only children who survived her. Rev. Mc Chesney officiated and burial took place beside her husband and five children. Hannah born year 1816.

WILLIAM A. Mc GREER, was born in Canada, 3 October 1838 and died at the age of fifteen years, seven months and twenty four days on 27 April 1854.

HUGH B. Mc GREER, was born 17 November 1845 and died at the age of one year, nine months and one day, on 18 August 1847.

From the Wisconsin Pinery for Thursday April 27, 1854 the obituary for, William A. Mc Greer, at his fathers residence, of consumption, on the 26th inst., died at the age of fifteen and seven months. Death has just removed from our midst, a youth whose unblemished character was before us all. If honesty of intention-if integrity in worldly transactions- if indefatigable exertion in the discharge of duties to parents, commends an individual to our esteem, then in memory of William A. Mc Greer is entitled to our greatest respect, for he was all this. He departed this life, trusting only in the merits of a crucified Redeemer. The friends of the family are requested to attend the funeral at the Episcopal Church tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

DANIEL H. Mc GREER, born 25 August 1847, died of consumption at the age of twenty two years, two months and seventeen days, on 14 November 1869.

NELLIE Mc GREER, a daughter of Hugh and Hannah, born 1856, died 19 January 1873, at the age of seventeen years.

ELEANOR Mc GREER, born 26 January 1854, died 13 September 1854 at the age of seven months and seventeen days.

CHARLOTTE Mc GREER, died in Antigo, Wisconsin 5 November 1905, she was born 16 January 1852 at Jordan, Portage County, Wisconsin. Services in Antigo were held at the Methodist church, the body was brought here by the Green Bay train. Rev. F. A. Nimitz of the St. Paul's Methodist Evangelical church officiated here. A large crowd of her friends met the arrival, John and his son Hugh, Albert Vaughn and Miss Lillian Mc Greer came for the funeral. Brain fever considered the cause of death, had been ailing for twelve years. When John moved to Antigo, Wisconsin he took the sisters, Charlotte and Hannah with him.

HANNAH Mc GREER, died at Antigo, the body arrived on #12 train and was taken to the Union Cemetery. Rev. F. S. Hayward of St. Paul's Methodist Evangelical church officiated at the grave side. She was born 1858 and passed away on 15 October 1914.

NETTIE WARREN Mc GREER, wife of John H. was born 2 January 1862, married 5 May 1881, at her death on 9 April 1882, left an infant son, born March 1882. She was only twenty years and three months of age. Her services were from the Episcopal church. Her husband, John H. Mc Greer, whose father built the first sawmill on the Plover River at Jordan, died at Antigo, Wisconsin and is buried there. He was an 1888 Democrat candidate for Assemblyman, but lost, later was the Representative for Langlade County. He dealt in real estate. His son, Hugh survives and a niece, Lillian Mc Greer who was his housekeeper.

A Welsh Protestant who befriended Father Dombrowski. The entire Mc Greer family converted to Catholicism in 1873. If so why are so many buried in the Union Cemetery in block 9?)

JOHN Mc LAUGHLIN, a infant of Claudius and Olive E. Mc Laughlin, was born 1 January 1852, died 14 January 1852. The mother, Olive E. was born 14 January 1828 at New York and died 8 September 1852 at the age of twenty four years, seven months and twenty four days. Claude was born 1826 at New York. Claudius was owner of lot 14 in block 7 in the Union Cemetery.

BENJAMIN Mc MILLAN , a Portage County Pioneer was born 12 February 1802, died at the age of sixty five years, six months on 12 August 1867.

CHARLES Mc MILLAN, born 11 July 1800, died 3 November 1873 at the age of seventy three years, three months and twenty two day.

OTHER Mc MILLIAN'S in Portage County:

David Stiles Mc Millan, 3 November 1883, the father of Ben F. and Charles and Mrs. S. B. Powell. D. M. Mc Millan, died at his home on the 3rd, born Fort Covington, New York on 1 January 1812. Moved to Malone, New York 1850, was in the Wool Manufacturing business, came to Wisconsin in 1864 to engage in lumbering.

#72 Gazette 3 May 1911. Mrs. D. S. Mc Millan, age 96, ree Harriet Newell, born 22 November 1815, married at age 19, the last of fifteen children. Two sons and a daughter survived her.

31 October 1900 p 5, Austin Mc Millan, died at Minneapolis, Minnesota Sunday, born Wellsville, Ohio 3 March 1854, was 47, leaves a widow and a small son. His first wife died twelves years ago.

Henry Mc Millan, born in New York, the son of David and Harriet Barbour Mc Millan, his wife, Mary age 25, born in New York, in 1870 had Richard age 12, born New York and Maude, age 5 born in New York.

David Mc Millan, was age 36, born in New York, his wife was Mahala, age 25, born in Vermont and Martha, age 17, Mary, age 13, Emmen? age 1?, Anna age ½ or 1½ years. Census figures not always easy to read.

In the Gazette for 27 January 1904, B. F. Mc Millan (Benjamin Franklin) son of David and Harriet had an almost fatal experience on the river. A lengthy write-up in that issue.

The Mc Millian's in the Union Cemetery in lot 12 of block 13 must be related some how.

PETER Mc MURRAY, worked as a blacksmith for the Wisconsin Central Railroad in the city of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. Born October 1850 at Pennsylvania, died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Walter Lighthart, of Chicago Heights, Illinois on 6 January 1930 at the age of eighty. After his first wife died, he remarried ten years later, she and the daughter and sons, Harry and John (born March 1887) survived him. Some relatives who attended the funeral, Frank Kinney, Herb Yorton, Mrs. Mary Packard, Mrs. Effie (Anthonie) Lighthart, Walter and John Mc Murray, Harry Mc Murray and John Doyle.

HARRIET AUGUSTA YORTON Mc MURRAY, had been ill for several years with consumption, died at the residence on Brown Street (College Avenue) They were married 18 May 1874. Her husband Peter, daughter, Katherine and sons, Harry and John survive. Funeral at the residence with Rev. W. Miller officiating. #137 SPDJ 9 January 1930 Frt p Col: 2 and 13 January 1930.

LELAH Mc MURRAY, born 4 May 1877 in Wisconsin, died 9 August 1879 at the age of two years, three months and five days, in Stevens Point. There is an L. Mc MURRY, buried here also, only data 1875. They are all buried in block 4 of lot 17. George Reynolds owned the lot.

ALANSON MERRITT, at the time of death, stated he was born, 31 May 1820 at New York, later census, as being born in Pennsylvania. He was an early Pioneer, their home was on the West Side of the City, on the banks of the Wisconsin River, a couple of miles North of the City. He died 1 June 1899 at the age of seventy nine years, one month and twenty one days.

SARAH MARY WILBUR MERRITT, died after a long illness on 27 June 1896. Lived in the County since 1855. Born in Pennsylvania 1 June 1820. Her two children, Nama Maria and Andrew.

LEROY MERRITT, a son, the data on his stone in the Union Cemetery is unreadable. All buried in block 20 and lot 2.

HOPLONA MESSER, born about 1858 are buried in lot 14 of block 18 in the Union Cemetery. These two children could be related to Salley Benson as the daughter was first married to a Messer, then remarried to a Dodge.

SAMUEL S. METCALF, Sam was born in New York 18 April 1825 and died at the age of thirty six years, one month and eleven days, on the 29th of May 1861. His wife Adella survived him, she was born about 1843 and married 1859, so was about nineteen years his junior. Samuel is buried in lot 7 of block 2. Hiram Smith is the original owner.

In previous recorded records listed Robert and Bradley as being buried here. Robert Metcalf is buried in the Greenwood Cemetery in Amherst, Wisconsin. No other data on Bradley Metcalf. No doubt a connection to Sarah Metcalf Maddy Kinney.

JOHN D. MILLER, a Civil War Veteran, fought in Co D 5th Reorganized, born in New York 1848, died at the age of thirty four years in 1882.

PAULINE F. MILLER, who was born 1853 and died in 1874, she was twenty one.

John D. Miller's will was probated 6 October 1884.

GRANDMA (Miller)? Grandma is the only name on the stone, she may be Fred Miller's wife.

FRED MILLER, met with a fatal accident, walking along the Green Bay and Winona railroad tracks, did not hear engineer Long when he blew the whistle, Fred being deaf. Because it was too late to stop the train, he received a blow on the shoulder breaking bones which Dr. Southwick set, but the shock was too much, he died an hour later. He was born 1817, so was seventy six or seven years old, lived with his sister, Mrs. Mary Zell, 736 Water Street (2157) in the City. The jury concluded the deceased did not heed the whistle because of being deaf. They are buried in lot 3 of block 5. John Miller the owner.

EDDIE MITCHEL, the young son of Samuel and Flora Mitchell, was born 21 January 1873, died 21 November 1874, at the age of one year, ten months and twenty one days.

SAMUEL T. MITCHELL, born at Port Edwards, Washington County, New York, on 19 October 1848, at the time of his death on 9 December 1887, he was thirty nine years, one month and thirteen days of age. In 1857 with his parents came to Neenah, Wisconsin and to Stevens Point in 1872. He was employed with the Central Company as a passenger Conductor for about seven or eight years. The body was brought from Ashland, Wisconsin by train and laid to rest in the Union Cemetery. He had been ill for about five weeks with consumption. He was a member of the Evergreen Lodge and the Forest Chapter, Masonic Honors were observed. The funeral from the Presbyterian Church. He was survived by his wife and two children, his aged mother in Washington Territory, a brother in Duluth and sisters, Mrs. C. B. Clark and Mrs. J. Mc Carthy of Neenah. The oldest child was eighteen and the youngest age nine. Samuel Thomas Mitchell was laid beside his son Eddie. MARY ELIZABETH MILLETT, the daughter of David and Catherine Millett, was born 1838 and died 3 October 1855 at the age of seventeen years.

SOLOMON MILLETT, the son of David and Catherine Millett, was born 3 March 1838 and died 3 October 1856 at the age of eighteen years, seven months. The deaths are recorded in the book of early deaths at the Courthouse, Register of Deeds, Portage County, Wisconsin. Pages 10 and 13. Ben Millett owned lots 5 and 6 in block 1 of the Union Cemetery, record did not indicate if buried here. Ben Millett could have been a minister, but relationship unknown.

JOHN N. MORRISON, was the son of John H. and Marcia Eckels Morrison, born 6 May 1852, died 6 November 1852 at the age of six months. Marcia was the daughter of James Eckels who was born in Ohio on 27 May 1822 and died about 23 December 1896. John H. Morrison was born in Canada about 1834 and died at the National Soldiers Home in Milwaukee, Wisconsin on Sunday 17 January 1912 at the age of sixty seven years at the Veteran Home in King, Wisconsin. (Born 1845?). There was a John Morrison, born 24 January 1891 and passed away on 9 May 1916 known as the adopted son of Seely Hungerford. John H. Morrison was the owner of lot 9 in block 7 in the Union Cemetery. Others in the Plover cemetery. #71 Gazette 18 January 1912 Frt p Col: 2 Contradition

WILLIAM G. MORGAN, only data for him is that he died 16 June 1874, unknown if the son of Thomas Morgan. Buried in the Union Cemetery in lot 8 of block 18.

J. P. MOREY, only data is that he died 21 December 1868, Pamela A. Morey was the petitioner for the will of J. P. Morey, 25 March 1869. I would say Pamela was J. P. Morey's wife. He is buried in the Union Cemetery in lot 3 of block 15.

ABRAM MOYER, served in the Civil War with Co B 46th Regiment, born 1815 in New York, came with his wife to Wisconsin in 1856, he died in 1868.

HELEN STERLING MOYER, wife of Abe was born in Little Falls, New York on 26 May 1818. After Abe died, she took in washings to keep the family together. In 1885 she received a pension of \$1500 dollars, so she and son Abe went East to visit relatives. Squandered all the money, so on returning had to go back to being a domestic. Son Abe, died in 1895, but no indication he is buried in the Union Cemetery in lot 5 of block 4, Abram Moyer the original owner. Helen died at the age of eighty one years, ten months and fourteen days, dying on 10 April 1900.

GEORGE MEYERS, the grandson of Abe and Helen Moyer, the son of William W. and Addie Gilbert Meyers was born 9 October 1874 and died 3 October 1878, one year, eleven months and twenty four days. He is buried in lot 11 of block 13 which William Meyers owned, in the Union Cemetery.

He came to the United States at the age of three with his parents to Cincinnati, Ohio, arriving here in 1908. He was in the grocery store business until his wife died. Edward's parents were William H. and Elizabeth Stout Norton his wife was Mary E. Gross.

OTTO ORTHMAYER, the son of Anthony and Mary Orthmayer, was born February 2, 1871, died 22 August 1872, at the age of one year, six months and twenty days. His father, born in Bavaria, the children, Amanda, born 1869, Otto, 1871, Oscar, 1873, Edwin, 1877, Helen 1879 and Franklin, March 1880. Records on file at the Courthouse gave parents as A. and M. Orthmayer. Otto is buried in lot 7 of block 17 in the Union Cemetery.

JOHN M. PARK, a veteran of the Civil War, served in Co G 12th Regiment, was born 1811 and died 16 April 1861 at the age of forty eight years. The husband of Margaret. Buried in lot 4 of block 3.

MARY JANE PARK, the daughter of John M. and Margaret, was born 12 February 1847, died 12 January 1861, at the age of thirteen years and eleven months.

JAMES M. PARKS, the name seems to^{be} interchangeable, born 1843, died 2 January 1861 at the age of eighteen years, the son of John and Margaret Parks. John M. Park was the owner of the burial site in the Union Cemetery.

DENNIS PARKHILL, born 1813, died 27 November 1864 at the age of fifty one years. At this time the only other Parkhill in the City was Lafayette Parkhill, who had married into the prominent Copps Family. Burial in lot 3 of block 13. James Barr owner.
L. F. Parkhill, a manufacturer of Copper, Tin and Sheet-Iron Ware.

LOUISA HICKMOTH PARKS, was born in England, 1814, coming to New York in 1832, married in 1834 to John Parks (1834) in New York. They then moved to Tully, Onondagua County, New York, coming to Wisconsin in 1840. September 1853 found them in Portage County. At the time of her death there were four sons and one daughter, but only Fred, Catherine, Schuyler and one age eight were given. She died at the age of sixty four years on 19 October 1878, at the home of her son, Schuyler B. Parks.

CATHERINE C/B PARKS, a daughter of John and Louisa, was born 10 January 1842 in Wisconsin, but before coming to Stevens Point. She died 12 November 1862 at the age of twenty years, ten months and two days.

SCHUYLER BENJAMIN PARKS, was born in New York State, 10 October 1848, (which is different from his mother's obituary). Married, about 1876/7 to Mary Wagner, she survived along with nine children and a brother Stuart. He had been ill since October with heart trouble, he died at his home at 704 Illinois Avenue (2309) in the City, on 16 August 1916. Their children: Mrs. Edward Krentz, Mrs. George Kakaska (see Kakaska) of Joliet, Illinois, Mrs. Irving Altenburg, Mrs. Herbert King of the City, Charles and William of Phillips, Wisconsin, Theresa and Isabelle at home. Matt of Lead, North Dakota, and seven grandchildren. Mathew Parks, died 15 April 1970 from the SPDJ issue, Col: 4 p 2.

FRANK PARMETER, his death certificate states he died about the age three on 5 September 1888 of congestion. Frank is not on any record, the certificate states he is buried in the Union Cemetery. Vol: B p 24
The two children are buried with the grandparents, Dr. Alfred and Lorana Earll, in block 9 in lot 4.
The parents were married by Rev. A. C. Watts on 17 October 1877 at the brides residence. Their son Aubry, died 4 December 1918 at the age of thirty five, leaves a widow. A brother Earl, Herbert and sister Lulu survived him.

MARTHA PATTERSON, was the wife of John Patterson, born 10 May 1835 at Canada, and died 1 January 1886 at the age of fifty years, seven months and twenty one days. John Patterson, born 1830. William Allen Patterson was the owner of lot 1 in block 7.

OLE PEDERSON, born 18 January 1835, died at the age of forty two years, nine months and twenty one days on 9 November 1887. He is buried in the Joel Dixon lot 4 of block 5 in the Union Cemetery.

AUGUST PEICKARD, unable to find correct data. Born about 1829 and died 1866. Unknown if the husband of Loretta Heiman, or father of her husband. Another burial in this lot, but no data. An August Peichard, who died 5 January 1914 at 736 Water Street in the City, died at the age of sixty eight, his wife was Mary Louise Miller. (2159) The cemetery map showed only A. Peickard. The burial is in lot 11 of block 15 in the Union Cemetery. A August L. Peikard, died 15 Jan 1922 (18) any relation?

DAUGHTER OF DAVID AND LUCINDA REMEY GARDINER PEARL, child died at the age of three in 1859. The Pearl's were married in Portage County January 17, 1856. They then enlisted on the U. S. Schooner, Shark. He spent three years and nine months in the Navy during the Mexican War. A shipmate from Almond, Wisconsin, was A. Stevens, they spent two years aboard the Shark. The boat was wrecked in the mouth of the Columbia River in 1846. They parted and did not see each other until 1894. Francis La Mere was the owner of the lot 9 of block 1 in the Union Cemetery, in which they are buried.

MARY B. WISWALL, wife of James, born 1799, died 24 March 1866 at the age of sixty seven years. Julia Ann Priest Empey had a sister Mrs. M. E. Spoor, who died in San Jose, California and a sister, Mrs. Oscar Wiswall, Oscar could be the son of James and Mary B. Wiswall. Mrs. Spoor died on 18 October 1884. Is there a relationship here to the Priest family? Mrs. Oscar Wiswall died 23 November 1915.

ELIZABETH JARVIS WYLIE, the first wife of Melancthon Wylie (name was originally written HVILA) born 22 July 1807, died at the age of forty seven years, eleven months on 22 June 1855.

MELANCHTON WYLIE, born at Jackson, Pennsylvania on 1 September 1799. Was a farmer until 1847 when he bought land and built a Hotel, between Eau Pleine and Wausau, Wisconsin, for travelers. He died at his residence 25 November 1880 at the age of eighty one years, two months and sixteen days. Contributing cause Rheumatism and Dropsy. His second wife and five children survive. A son Frank lived on an adjoining homestead and Dr. Wylie lives at Wausau, Wisconsin.

ALTHINA BILLINGS WYLIE, was born at Lowell, Massachusettes, 17 December 1814, was married to Melancthon forty years ago on Thanksgiving day. He had advertised for a wife. Althina and her Mother came West in answer to the advertisement. Althina died at the home of her step son, Frank Wylie, on 25 December 1898 at the age of eighty four. She is buried in the Knowlton Cemetery, the funeral from the residence with Rev. A. A. Phelps officiating #54 Gazette Wed 28 December 1898 p 4.

Melancthon and Elizabeth are buried in the Union Cemetery in lot 7 of block 5.

SALLEY BILLINGS, Althina's mother died not too long after arriving here, the census classed her as a tailloress, whether or not she actually did tailoring is not known.

FRANK WYLIE, son of the pioneer, died at a Wausau, Wisconsin hospital of Cancer. Born 22 March 1840 in the state of Pennsylvania, came to Portage County with his father at the age of twelve. His wife was Elmira Reynolds, whom he married in 1867, she was the daughter of Alanson and Mary Merritt Reynolds. After her death he made his home with his children, Mrs. George Harder, Kate, born 1872, Mrs. Cora Davis, born 1876, Mrs. Frank D. Maine, Josephine, born 1882, Mrs. J. B. Duranso, sons Wallus and Joseph. There was also Lida, born 1868, and Adeline, born 1870. His remains were brought to the City by train, directly to the Union Cemetery burial in lot 18 of block 4.
He died 25 November 1910.

ALMIRA REYNOLDS WARNER WYLIE, born at Cattaraugus County, New York, May 13, 1843, she was first married to William Warner, who died in the Civil War. There were seven children, four daughters and three sons, the youngest was age twelve, when she died 10 July 1894 from the dread disease consumption. Had been ill for two years, bedridden since February. Only two daughters listed at the time of her death, Mrs. F. D. Maine, of Jordan, and Mrs. John B. Duranso, of Eau Pleine. The body was brought by train and burial in the Union Cemetery .

LINA A. WYLIE, born 10 September 1847, died at the age of eighteen years, two months and twenty three days, on 3 December 1865. She was the daughter of Melanchton Wylie. She is buried with Frank and Almira Wylie in the Union Cemetery.

The Wylie hotel was called the Plymouth House and was twelve miles north of Stevens Point, Wisconsin.

In November of 1989 a Raymond L. Wiley, of Hancock, Wisconsin area died, he was born 19 June 1902, the son of Frank and Jennie Wiley. JOHN CIRIAX ZIMMER, born 27 January 1792, died 2 September 1875 at the age of eighty three years, ten months and eighteen days. He was born at Willengen, Germany, his wife was Margaret Graf. Unknown if she is buried here. He is lot 8 of block 2 of the Union Cemetery.
